Assessment Procedure

- The assessment process was discussed during the October, November and December, 2021 Action Team meetings.
- The first focus group met to test the process in December 2021 led by Tammy Schneider from EMS.
- Action Team met in January to finalize assessment process. Group decided to complete assessment process by offering focus groups and allowing individuals to complete individual assessments if they did not want to participate in a focus group.
- Surveys and Focus Groups (Named Community Conversations) were completed January 2022-May 30, 2022.

Surveys and focus group notes were scanned and sent to Sheila Greuel by email. The data was analyzed by Sheila Greuel who developed this report.

Individual Responses To Training

- 4 people have experienced dementia training and education (Three through work when they were employed).
- 7 People have had no training and education related to dementia.
- 1 person did not know if they had experienced any training and education related to dementia.
- One person had attended the Savvy Caregiver program provided by a Caregiver Advisor.
- The others had experienced training in the work setting and one at graduate school.
- One individual reported that they felt the personal experience had been their training.

Your Thoughts?

- Survey has given merit to what our original thinking was.
- We need awareness of Programs and Trainings
- We need targeted specific trainings for professionals, caregivers and community members.



Recommendations

- The need for training within the community, among family caregivers and for professionals in all sectors.
- The need for Adult Day Services.
- The need for expanded local assessment/diagnostic capabilities.
- The need for marketing of existing services.



Next Good Steps

- Need to plan to increase awareness of the disease and how to help caregivers
- Need to develop a plan to provide education programs in the various sectors
- Need to develop strategies to increase existing resource awareness
- Adult Day Services (Sponsored through the IDOA Community Care Program) are needed in our community. We need to find a new provider of such services.
