

Workforce Issues

- Home care agencies, Care Coordination Units, Adult
 Protective Service providers, Caregiver Resource Centers
 and Area Agencies on Aging are challenged in staff
 recruitment and retention
 - Managed Care Organizations contracted by the state are able to provide higher wages and benefits
- Higher salaries and benefits are needed in all staffing categories in addition to enhanced training, certifications and educational benefits.
- Funding is needed to incentivize persons to work on behalf of a growing aging population.



Preparing for Conclusion of ARPA Funding


- Due to inflation to cost of service provision is increasing

2022 Statewide Accomplishments Family Caregivers

- Establishment of IL Family Caregiver Coalition supported by public and private funding, over 200 members and counting
- 84 Caregiver Resource Centers (CRC) are being strengthened
- Launched an evidence-based caregiver assessment tool (T-Care)

Illinois Caregiver Coalition

 Under an RRF Foundation grant, in 2022 IAS built and maintained a strong and broad Statewide Caregiver Coalition.

• The Coalition:

- Advocates for continued state funding of the Illinois Family Caregiver Act
- Identifies and promote other needed changes in policies to support family and other unpaid caregivers
- Launched a public awareness campaign about the issue of caregiving through media outlets statewide and other strategies that will include engagement of industry



What Caregivers are Saying

75 year old male caregiver to his sister states: (DuPage County resident)

- The T-Care assessment was "to see if you are under stress and help you find resources. . . without that, I was just floating on my own!"
- I want policy makers to know that caregivers need "reliable expert assistance that they can trust and depend on."
- I want society "to realize that when trying to help someone with dementia, you don't have any sense of how to go about it . . . without help, you are just struggling in the dark."



Words from Another Caregiver

Husband diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease (Edgar County Resident)

- Caregiver expressed a deep sense of loss explaining, "this is not the man I married . . . this is the man that you have now and the one you have to care for."
- With an assessment, caregiver is linked to a support group. This is an opportunity to "know other people in my situation talk with others about how they handle similar situations . . . (tell) how I'm feeling about losing him one day at a time."
- Regarding message to policymakers, we "need support . . financial, emotional and sometimes even physical."



2022 Statewide Accomplishments Social Isolation

With funding from the RRF Foundation, Illinois Aging Services (IAS) contracted the National Opinion Research Center (NORC) to evaluate programs offered by IL AAAs to combat social isolation.

- Research was conducted by NORC at the University of Chicago in collaboration with CJE SeniorLife
- The overarching objective was to assess and document a "robust characterization of programs as they are being designed and implemented in response to both the social isolation initiative and the evolving needs related to the COVID-19 pandemic."

Qualitative Findings

 "Qualitative findings suggest that reducing social isolation requires an array of programs that can meet a continuum of social needs".

Positive Impact

- Programs had positive impacts when they met local or cultural preferences for socializing.
 - Ex: rural, LGBTQ+, ethnic, racial and faithbased communities

Targeting

- Black older adults are consistently overrepresented
- Hispanic older adults are underrepresented
- Men are consistently underrepresented

We are working on strategies to engage more men and Hispanic/Latinx older adults.

FY 2022 Impact

- Information and Assistance Connected 41,000 older adults to services helping them make aging easier.
- Caregiver Supports Helped 3,076 caregivers identify stressors and develop strategies to reduce burnout.
- Benefits Enrollment Helped older adults save \$1.9 million in benefits.
- Nutrition Delivered 607,711 meals reducing the fear of hunger.
- Wellness Programs Provided education and programing to help older adults change behavior and develop healthy habits.
- Vaccine Education Provided clear and accurate information about COVID vaccines to 1.5 million people in the Metro East.





FY 23-24 Area Plan Initiatives

- Reducing Social Isolation & Loneliness -
 - *Provided a welcoming place for caregivers of older adults to gather together.
 - *Engaged youth and older adults in conversation using music, movement and nature.
 - *Provided 2,735 calls to older adults helping them reduce their loneliness.
- Chore/Tech Pilot Offered in home services to address social isolation including minor in home technology support and simple tasks around their home such as bulb replacement, changing smoke detector batteries and small repairs.





2023 American Rescue Plan (ARPA) Funded Initiatives

- **Nutrition Counseling** 289 older adults received assistance in setting priorities, establish goals and create individualized nutrition plans.
- **Special Diets for Meals on Wheels** Offered specialized meals for those older adults who required a nutritionally tailored meal.
- Housing Preservation Helped older adults maintain their home who were close to foreclosure.
- **Weekend Meals** Provided home delivered meals on the weekend expanding meals from 5 per week to 7.
- Tech Literacy programs Enabling older adults to stay socially connected, tech-wise and cyber-safe by teaching how to protect personal information online ad avoid becoming a victim of identify theft.
- Mobility Solutions Offered practical ideas and products to enhance independent living using the expertise of trained therapists.
- SmartCompass Developed an app for caregivers to give them the resources at their fingertips and link them to a caregiver specialist.

Fund the Illinois Family Caregiver Act

The law, PA 93-0864 passed in 2004, established a caregiver support program to assist unpaid caregivers including grandparents raising grandkids (kinship care) through training and education to develop essential caregiving skills and other interventions to provide relief and reduce stress. In 2022, the Illinois General Assembly passed \$4 million in state funding to support the Illinois Family Caregiver Act for FY23. This was the first time the act has been funded at the state level. We greatly appreciate the \$4 million appropriation however, more funding is needed to adequately support Illinois Family Caregivers.



For many voters in Illinois, the majority do NOT believe that the Illinois state government offers enough support for unpaid family caregivers.

Just over 1 in 10 say that the state government offers enough support for family caregivers. And over half of White, Black, and Hispanic voters as well as Independents and Democrats say the state government does not offer enough to help caregivers. And, about a third overall are not sure if the state government offers enough support for family caregivers.

☐ Increase Illinois Family Caregiver Act funding from \$4m to \$6m to support unpaid family caregivers through the aging network's Caregiver Resource Centers.

INCREASE STATE FUNDING TO COMBAT SOCIAL ISOLATION

☐ Increase State Social isolation funding from \$1m to \$2m to support innovative programs to alleviate isolation among older people.

INCREASE STATE FUNDING FOR ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE AND RELATED DISORDERS

☐ Increase Funding to Illinois Area Agencies on Aging for Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders from \$1m to \$2m to "fill the gaps" in services as well as fund evidence-based training for caregivers.

SUSTAIN STATE FUNDING FOR HOME DELIVERED MEALS

☐ Current funding levels meet the increased demand for meals and supports the skyrocketing costs for food, gas and labor.
